Sea Trials for Bulldog Armada

The ingenuity never fails to impress. U.S. Navy JROTC students invest weeks, often consulting family members, friends and neighbors with engineering backgrounds, designing their ships as a final project.

Finally, when the sea trials arrive, they wait with anxiety as one-by-one they launch their ships into the pool at Richards High School. And then Cmdr. Doug Groters, the senior naval science instructor, leaps into the water to create waves — massive to the scale of the ships — to truly test buoyancy.

Students earn their grades based on creativity, design, details, and weapons and propulsion systems. Each vessel also featured an American flag, name, and a letter-number designator like those found on all U.S. Navy ships.

“The ship design and construction project is the capstone on a semester in which the cadets learn about how naval ships are planned, designed and constructed,” Groters said.

The curriculum also features an operational dimension.

“We learn the operational and administrative organizational structure of naval ships and how sailors are trained to control damage to the ship in case of fire, flooding or weapons attack,” he added.

It was a solemn moment for Boy Scout Troop 596 as two of its own, Andrew Maikisch and Patrick Richards High School band director Charles Martin and his students didn't see much of their homes in early April. They were too busy winning trophies and entertaining the masses.

When Martin introduced his Jazz Ensemble at the District 218 Arts Extravaganza on Saturday, April 9th, he mentioned that they'd just returned from Bloomington at a competition hosted by Illinois State University.

“We had to leave to get here to perform, so we don't know whether we've won anything,” Martin said.

It turns out the Jazz Ensemble not only won a trophy but came close to winning Grand Champion for the second time in three years.

Jazz Ensemble won first place in Class AA at the Illinois State University Jazz Invitational. The Richards students also totaled the second-highest points of any group in all categories.

The win at ISU follows Jazz Ensemble's selection as one of eight in the state to perform at the Illinois Music Education Association conference in January, in Peoria.

Richards announces Illinois State Scholars for 2015-2016



Richards High School in Oak Lawn proudly announces that 25 members of the 2016 senior class have been named Illinois State Scholars by the Illinois Student Assistance Commission.

Roughly 10 percent of the state's high school seniors earn this recognition each year. In order to earn Illinois State Scholar honors, students must:

- Attend an Illinois State recognized high school;
- Be a United States citizen or an eligible noncitizen;
- Be a resident of Illinois;
- Take the ACT, SAT I, or Prairie State Achievement

Exam during the third or fourth semester prior to graduation from high school (typically between Sept. 1 and June 30 of the junior year);

- Rank in the top one-half of his or her high school class at the end of the third semester prior to graduation from high school (typically as a junior in their sixth semester); and
- Graduate from high school during the academic year in which the student is selected as a State Scholar.

Short-term and long-term goals?

Oak Lawn Regional Emergency Communications Information on Wireless 911 Calls

The number of 911 calls placed by people using wireless phones has significantly increased in recent years. It is estimated that about 80 percent of 911 calls placed to Oak Lawn Regional Emergency Communications Center are from wireless phones, and that percentage is growing. For many Americans, the ability to call 911 for help in an emergency is one of the main reasons they own a wireless phone.

Wireless 911

When 911 is dialed from a landline phone from a home or business, the caller's location and phone number is sent to that location's Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP). This allows the 911 call taker to dispatch police, fire or EMS to the caller's location, even if the caller cannot communicate with the 911 call taker.

Different From Landline Calls

Making wireless 911 calls is different from making a landline 911 call. When a wireless 911 call is made from a cell phone, that call is transmitted to the nearest cell tower. The cell tower then sends that call via landline to the PSAP that is designated to receive 911 calls from that area.

Wireless 911 Calls Issues

The wireless 911 caller must be aware that the PSAP who answers the call may not be the PSAP that services the area that the wireless caller is calling from. Knowing the location is vital to getting the appropriate police, fire or Emergency Medical Services (EMS) units to respond. Issues arise when the nearest cell tower is in a different police, fire or EMS jurisdiction or different county than the one that the wireless 911 caller is calling from. This 911 call has to be transferred to the correct PSAP. This presents life-threatening problems due to the lost response time if the caller is unable to communicate where they are or where the emergency is.

Helpful Hints

- Do not become irritated if your call is transferred to another PSAP and you are requested to repeat information you may have already given to the previous 911 call taker.
- Do not hang up until your call is answered and the information you have is correctly relayed to the 911 call taker.
- Give an exact street number and street name if possible, or the closest intersections.
- Know the location of the incident. Providing an accurate address is critically important when making a wireless 911 call.
- It is helpful to know your cell phone number, to give to the call taker.
- Provide a business name or landmark if the address is not known. It is important to remain calm while on the phone so that the call taker can understand you.



Pace Bus to Transition to Posted-Stops-Only Service

If you're used to catching your local Pace bus by flagging it down en route, be aware that things are about to change.

According to a statement issued May 5th by Pace Chairman Richard Kwaneski, in an effort to improve public safety and efficiency, Pace buses will be converting all of its bus routes to a posted-stops-only model. The changes are in line with Pace's long-term plans to modernize its system and provide better information to its customers about Pace routes.

In response to a detailed study to determine the safest locations for bus stops along Route 383, taking into account volume of ridership and other factors, Pace will begin relocating or installing new bus stop signs at the locations designated in the accompanying chart. Once the conversion is complete and all of the posted stops are installed, Pace customers will only be able to board at those locations.




